There were places you would step and it would almost swallow your boots. I was happy most had waterproof boots to wear as it saved our feet from being completely wrecked. Although it was colder last night, I believe everyone slept pretty well. We were up at 6:45 this morning and began the clean up process. The boys got everything shuttled down to the trailer and put away. They had breakfast, then we had a thanksgiving scout's own service by Nico. We did our round of thorns and roses, policed the area, then headed out. We were back to the Gatehouse by 10:45. Overall, we had another very successful turkey camp and as usual made the best out of the situation. It always amazes me how we adapt and overcome. Seems we do this in some form every outing.
